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Idea Stage



Starting your business

Register your business: At this stage, you should register your business. There are three levels of registrations to consider:

- 1. Register with the IRS for your EIN number.
- 2. Register your business with the State.
- 3. Register your business with the city which your business is located in.

No matter what the business's structure falls under, you must register with the IRS. If your business is a sole proprietorship or traditional partnership; register with the Washington State Depart-ment of Revenue, which can also provide a UBI number (Exceptions apply).
